Inner City Law Center is a nonprofit poverty-law firm dedicated to ensuring that every Angeleno has access to safe, decent, and affordable housing.

With the generous support of donors, foundations, and volunteers, our diverse team of more than 150 staff members — including more than 75 attorneys — fights for justice on behalf of:

- People experiencing homelessness
- Low-income tenants and working-poor families
- People living with HIV or struggling with disabilities
- Families with children in the child welfare system
- Unhoused veterans, immigrants, and others who have been systemically overlooked


In the midst of the most severe homelessness crisis Los Angeles has ever faced, ICLC stands on the frontlines of the struggle. We are fighting to end housing injustice.

Inner City Law Center's mission is to ensure decent, safe, and habitable housing for the enormous number of homeless and working poor families and individuals residing in Los Angeles.

OUR HISTORY

In 1980, Nancy Mintie graduated from UCLA Law School and moved to the Catholic Worker soup kitchen in Skid Row, where she began offering free legal services to the homeless and working poor residents of the neighborhood. This was the beginning of Inner City Law Center.

Born inside a rusty construction trailer behind the Catholic Worker soup kitchen (aka the Hippy Kitchen), ICLC has grown into the only full-time provider of legal services headquartered in Skid Row. Guided by the belief that every person deserves dignity and respect, we continue to fight tirelessly to secure housing and justice for those with nowhere else to turn.



A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

Dear Friends,

It is an honor to serve as the CEO of Inner City Law Center as we continue to fight to end homelessness in Los Angeles.

Last year, Inner City Law Center represented clients in 3,258 legal matters. We recovered \$20,545,491.27 for our clients, as we focused on helping them to move off the streets to remain stably housed. These are life-changing recoveries, as 44% of our clients live on less than \$10,000 a year.

Last year we filed the largest housing discrimination case in California's history, representing the Human Rights Initiative in 112 complaints against 203 real estate agents, brokerage firms, and landlords who illegally discriminated against families with Section 8 youchers.

Also, in a lawsuit we filed with Public Counsel, Brown, Goldstein & Levy, and Robins Kaplan LLP on behalf of fourteen veterans experiencing homelessness, we obtained a watershed ruling when a federal court ordered the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs to build thousands of new units of housing for low-income veterans.

We also celebrated major legislative victories. California Governor Gavin Newsom signed two of our sponsored bills that focus on increasing housing affordability throughout the state. Locally, after more than a year of advocacy, the Los Angeles City Council voted to strengthen the Anti-Tenant Harassment Ordinance. We also played a key role in helping pass Measure A in Los Angeles County, which will create new affordable housing and bolster local homeless services.

Our work and these victories—whether in the courtroom, the legislature, or on the streets of Los Angeles—are a testament to the power of your support and engagement. Solving homelessness requires bold, sustained efforts across multiple fronts. As we continue this fight, Inner City Law Center is deeply grateful to have you by our side.

Together, we will keep pushing forward.

We were honored to again be recognized by the State Bar as a DEI Gold Seal recipient for our anti-racist, trauma-informed approach to housing justice.

As we look ahead, our Board is resolute. The challenges before us are great, but so too is the power of the ICLC community. With your support, we will continue to stand on the front lines of the struggle to ensure that every Angeleno has a place to call home.





Our 2024 Public Policy Victories

In 2024, Inner City Law Center achieved major policy wins that expanded tenant protections, secured new resources for affordable housing, and strengthened legal support for renters facing eviction. Through these victories, ICLC reinforced its role as a leading voice for housing justice — expanding legal protections, securing long-term resources, and advancing policies that protect renters and promote affordable housing across Los Angeles and California.

Measure A Passed: ICLC played a leading role in the successful passage of Measure A — the Affordable Housing, Homelessness Solutions, and Prevention Now initiative. This victory ensures sustainable funding for homeless services, affordable housing, and a countywide Right to Counsel program for tenants.

Countywide Win: In July, the LA County Board of Supervisors approved a Tenant Right to Counsel Ordinance, securing legal representation for low-income renters in facing eviction in unincorporated areas of Los Angeles.

Citywide Win: Working with the Right to Counsel Coalition and Councilmember Nithya Raman, ICLC helped secure unanimous approval of a Right to Counsel ordinance in the City of Los Angeles. These initiatives, funded through Measure A and Measure ULA, move LA closer to ensuring all tenants have legal support when fighting to remain in their homes.

Anti-Harassment Ordinance (TAHO): ICLC successfully pushed for stronger protections, higher penalties for landlord harassment, and better enforcement of the law.

Ban on "Renovictions": ICLC fought for new protections to prevent landlords from displacing tenants under the pretense of remodeling their units.

Rent Cap: ICLC won a 3% cap on annual rent increases in unincorporated LA County, and continues to advocate for similar protections elsewhere.

SB 7 Becomes Law: Strengthened fair housing planning by incorporating the voices of unhoused communities into California's housing needs assessments.

AB 2667 Becomes Law: Improved the state's Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing law by requiring jurisdictions to track fair housing progress with standardized metrics.
